Musical Director's Message: by Bill Litz

As you plan to come to chorus rehearsal every Tuesday, **what are your expectations**? What memories of past rehearsals do you hope to experience again? What things could happen that would make each rehearsal worthwhile?

Since we embraced a new direction into the *Mixed Chorus Competition* realm, I've been trying to **envision what excites each of you** about being a Portsmen. Things that come to my mind are:

- Making beautiful music
- Being a better singer
- Being a better performer
- Being more healthy
- Sharing friendships
- Entertaining others
- Teaching others
- Keeping the unique style of barbershop alive.

Those are all pretty standard things that anyone in any chorus might say, but I don't think we experience all those things every week. They say a picture is worth a thousand words – so I included some links of the

The members of Heavy Medal come from all regions of Germany and we meet only two or three times a year for rehearsals. But the weekend is always an event: singing from morning to night and then comfortably with a lot of laughter and fun to end the evening ... or even the night.

group – **Heavy Medal Chorus** – that has inspired me. My intent in this discussion is not for the Portsmen to become them (or any other group), but there are things about them that I think will motivate you, too.

The make up their chorus is quite different from ours in that:

- They only meet 2 or 3 times a year
- Ages are younger
- Music selection is more challenging

But there are traits that we could incorporate into our training and performances and into developing the way we view ourselves.

- Get ready for Nashville

A number of things caught my eye that would make our experience more enjoyable and allow new levels of excellence.

Before rehearsal even starts, there is a buzz of excitement – some people warming up their voices, some stretching and loosening up their bodies, some working the choreography, some getting individual coaching, and some chatting and enjoying each other's company. Is that energy something you'd like to feel more of before and after rehearsals?

I didn't realize until I went to their web site (thank you Google for translating it from German), that they only get together a few times a year. Because of that, they come prepared - knowing their music, knowing the basic choreography, bringing their excitement and best abilities to the rehearsal, and ultimately to the performance. They **expect** magic to happen when they are together. Because we meet weekly, you might not feel that push to come prepared, expecting instead to learn the music in chorus. I was pleasantly surprised in preparing for the ice cream social that we didn't need to teach everything in I'm Looking Over A Four Leaf Clover — many of you did your homework that allowed us to manage the song. Does being prepared bring more enjoyment to your chorus experience? Do your homework so you can lead as opposed to lean.

They come with the goal of **being entertainers**. They **move freely** and look comfortable in their own skin. They **want to communicate** the meaning and feeling of the song to the audience. For me, the most memorable instruction in the <u>Get ready for Nashville</u> video was at the 1:29 mark – "**dig into any important word** – that will make the audience feel a great performance." Deliver each song as an individual with energy while being aware of how you fit into the way the group delivers the message of each song.

They are good singers, and they strive to be even better singers. Notice that I DID NOT put this into the section above about things that make them different – You are a good singer and can strive to be a better singer. I'm sure they learn things from singing in the group, but they each do individual practice to be better singers. Does bringing in coaching and working on the craft of singing in rehearsal give you new skills and confidence to perform better? That is the starting point for your personal growth to overcome singing and performance weaknesses. Sing daily to strengthen your instrument and cultivate confidence. Commit to a personal goal that can make your experience better. You might want to:

- Improve your tone quality
- Increase your range (sing higher or lower notes)
- Learn to read music
- Improve your singing diction (pure vowel production)
- Move more freely
- Connect with your audience in a genuine authentic manner
- Sing in a quartet or a very large quartet(VLQ)
- Develop memorization techniques

Share with me your goal on how you can be a better singer as we continue through the contest cycle this year so that I can work with the music team and your section leaders to help create steps for your improvement.

They have **pride** in **their group**! They are clearly pleased with their performances and recordings. I loved watching them sign their CDs – would you like to be able to create something permanent to remember our moments? I'm sure they have moments when songs are rough, but they know that their final product is going to be amazing. What would make you feel the confidence to know that we would be amazing in our performances – confidence that will make you excited to invite your friends and family to see you?

They **bring positive energy**. Do you feel energized or drained at the end of a rehearsal? My desire is that after each rehearsal and performance that we feel strength and success. Help me to identify when you don't feel that so that we can replace exhausting situations with ones that buoy us up and make us never want to miss being together.

Take some time to look at other Heavy Medal performances (there are three links above). Glean ideas on how your performance can be better. What concepts do they employ that we could use to make our chorus performances more entertaining – ones our audiences will want to make sure they never miss?

I can't wait to hear from each of you and see what we can accomplish together.






Tune Struck Quartet


