The View from the Helm

How many of you actually read anything that I write, much less the whole Newsletter? I would hope that you all hung on every word and would even be aware of the numbering discrepancies in my submissions (will say for those that do, that the Editor deemed #27 unfit for publication and #28 was deemed by me to be worthless to type).

As I have talked about in the past, I see myself as the harbor pilot, and that the regular blue water navigation is the responsibility of the Director.

Have you ever considered the issues that might arise when the same ship and crew enter the same harbors all the time, like a cargo ship that takes a week to traverse between the same two ports? They would be entering and leaving each of the two ports every other week, likely with the same harbor pilots - how does the harbor pilot know more than the Ship Captain that is there every other week? The more one experiences things, the more understanding they develop. It is a slow thing that includes both education/understanding and confidence.

I am not a Naval Officer, but I know that as one progresses up through the ranks, the requirements to drive the ship increase, with the expectation that one becomes a 'Ship's Commander' eventually. While most that are in control of ships these days have a minimum rank of Commander, during World War II, most submarines were under the command of Lieutenants or Lieutenant Commanders. Still the need for understanding and confidence of how to maneuver the ship is paramount to keep the vessel in the fight.

Tune Struck is my third quartet, singing Lead in the first and Tenor in the next. As I started, I had a lot of trepidation about myself and my role in the quartet. Having sung with Tune Struck for 20 years now, it has surprised me how much understanding and confidence I have developed.

Regular quartet participation makes you learn and become surer of what you know and how to present each song. Being in a pickup quartet, singing chorus songs or even a couple of songs for a specific event does not teach or develop the same level of skill as being in a long-standing foursome. There is nothing like having yourself on the line to make that confidence in what you know become solidified.

Now that the Portsmen are Divisional Champions; with a special trip to France on the docket and the Fall Convention and Chorus Contest to display ourselves, the question each of us HAS to ask ourselves is; "what do we know and how confident are we in that knowledge?" Are you ready to stand on your own and deliver? Do you fully understand your own shortcomings, such that you can understand how to minimize them?

There are a lot of things that each of us can do to improve our skills. Just had Bill tell us at a rehearsal that one of the big issues from Division in Fremont was "sync" related to 'attacks' and 'releases' – how each phrase is started and finished.

Those are the things that succeed or fail on confidence. Singing confidently means that you are not waiting for the individual you think knows their stuff do the next thing – instead you are doing what you know is right. When we all agree on what 'is right' and do what 'is right', we won't have those sync issues. Another way to help that is to keep our eyes open and on the hands of the Director. When Rapheal was here to coach us a bit, that was an item he pointed out, that we were not watching Bill, for our eyes were closed. Judges may not be close enough to see that (but eyelids have a different shine than eyes), but they can hear the sync issues.

In a couple of weeks we will be presenting our Annual Show, with way more songs than we have sung on a show – a number of them not long in our repertoire, which means we have to really buckle down to get them presentable. Working hard to develop the confidence in them and ourselves will go a long way to make our presentations in Normandy and Bakersfield better.

Musical Director's Message: By Bill Litz

I had the pleasure of going to see Jordan in New York in April. In addition to seeing Wicked, I also was inspired by a visit to the *Voices of Gotham Chorus* and enjoyed the thought-provoking musical, Hadestown.

Escaping Hell, or *Hadestown*, is a central plot point revolving around the ancient Greek myth of Orpheus and Eurydice. Orpheus, a gifted musician, is determined to rescue his beloved Eurydice from the clutches of Hades, the ruler of Hadestown. Orpheus is granted permission to lead Eurydice out of the underworld on the condition that he doesn't look back at her until they have both reached the surface. Their journey teaches them the importance of mutual trust, effective communication, and unwavering faith in each other, serving as the foundation for their love to transcend the depths of Hell and conquer all obstacles in their path.

We probably think of the director as the leader and of the chorus members as the followers. But as *The Portsmen Chorus* continues to improve, individuals need to be better leaders AND followers, depending on the situation. Switching between leadership and follower roles requires a diverse skill set that encompasses both assertiveness and adaptability.

The director (and music team) can come up with a plan that makes artistic decisions about phrasing, interpretation, and expression. But for the chorus to become more fluid and expressive, each individual needs to internalize the plan and themselves become leaders that emotionally connect with the audience and fellow singers. In that same moment, they must be aware of the rest of the ensemble, not to follow blindly, but to adjust to the ebb and flow of energy in the moment. It the becomes the director's job to bring unity to the musical interpretation, smoothing the imperfections and helping each singer to make better choices in delivering the artistic plan. Each performance takes a balance of communication and trust that takes developing traits internally and between each other.

- <u>Be Dependable</u>: Each member must fulfill their role, whether it's hitting the right notes, maintaining tempo, or following the director's cues
- <u>Listen</u>: Be attentive to other singers and the director to maintain cohesion and synchronization within the group
- <u>Provide Feedback</u>: Constructive feedback and being receptive to feedback from fellow singers fosters improvement and mutual understanding
- <u>Be Reliable</u>: Come prepared, attend rehearsals, and contribute to the group effort that builds trust with fellow chorus members
- <u>Be Vulnerable</u>: Share your feelings and emotions with the audience and among members as you trust, support and encourage each other
- <u>Revel in Unity</u>: Recognize you are part of a larger ensemble and that your individual contributions contribute to the collective sound

By leading with confidence and using our senses to feel support from each other and adapt to the changes in the moment, we can move forward to artistically reach the end of each word, each phrase, each song, and each endeavor together.

STOCKTON PORTSMEN RATED #1

In the world of football there was a was a team which had the fastest runners, strongest passers, and coordinated efforts to move the ball downfield enormous distances, seemingly at will. What did they have? What made them special? Knute Rockne summed it up with two words: "The Team." A car doesn't move by itself, nor does it move only because it has tires. Nor does it move only because it has a carburetor, spark plugs, or fuel. Nor does it move only because it has axles, a transmission, crankshaft, and cooling system. It moves because all of these, in synchronized unity, work together to become a powerful machine. Success is more than inspiration, it is the unity of thought, mind, belief, and effort.

In speaking at a military graduation, General Douglas MacArthur emphasized the ideas of Knute Rockne and the need to function as an integrated unit, each man a part of the whole, each man knowing his importance and the importance of others if success is to be achieved. No man is alone. Each man is part of something larger than himself, he is a part of what MacArthur called "The Corps," the group which, when spiritually bonded, with its many talents, can make a good accounting of itself in the presence of any challenge.

On April 15th, 2024, a little group of twenty singers went to Fremont, California for the Far Western District Barbershop Chorus Competition. Many larger choruses, many prestigious choruses, and even the perennial champions were already there. After the competition, the emcee announced the winners of the various category levels. The little group of twenty noticed that the Plateau AA competitions, their plateau, had not been mentioned. Everything had been awarded on the basis of total point scores, but the little chorus was not mentioned.

Now came the announcement of the highest scoring chorus in the Eastern Division of the Far Western District. A hush fell over the audience....and then came the name of the little chorus....and then a thunderous applause....The little chorus from Stockton had won the Eastern District Competition, for the first time since their inception nearly seventy years agoand all the regular choruses were present! Trophies were handed out, photos were taken, handshakes and hugs followed.....but...... HOW DID IT HAPPEN?? WHA>>>?

Knute Rockne knew the answer. Douglas MacArthur knew the answer. The STOCKTON PORTSMEN BARBERSHOP CHORUS had been unified by its director, the one and only Bill Litz, and by the unified spirit of esprit and camaraderie that had been building for an entire year. Individuals stepped forward: Al Wolter, Sue Atkins, Brad Nieman, Al Farnum, Joan Ray, Dave Harmon, Nancy Hennefer, Kitty Harmon, and a chorus determined to prove they were more than just pretty faces.

Skills were brought forward, encouragement was freely given, respect and confidence arose, devotion became a thought that accompanied personal practice. The Stockton Portsmen were coming of age, they had become.... a "TEAM."

As the Portsmen continue to build, we will be needing 2025 officers to step forward. We will be needing individuals to step forward and back up these officers. We will be needing to hear the words: "Count me in!"...."Yes. I'll do it!!"...."I've got it done, Captain!"

Our Annual Show lies just ahead on May 11th, followed by Normandy, France on June 4th. Let's show the audiences why we wear the Eastern Division crown.



High Priority formed in April, 2014 and fairly quickly won the 2014 AZ & Far Western District SENIORS Championships that fall, then went on the win the silver medal in 2015 in New Orleans at the International Seniors Quartet Contest.

Just one year later they were finally crowned Seniors Quartet Champions at the 2016 Midwinter Convention in Reno. High Priority is Ray Estes – Tenor, Byron Bennett – Lead, Mark House – Baritone, and Dan Davenport – Bass.

Comment from Dr. Sarah Parks, Assistant Professor of Music and Director of Music Programs, St. Norbert College, "We decided to do barbershop for the first time. By the end, their ears were working so much better. When they heard a chord for the first time, that's when intonation made sense. Now they're coming back and asking for more." Time at camp is divided between general sessions and small class sessions which afford the campers a chance to interact with the clinicians and teaching quartets. Tag singing ...time to relax ... fun social activities like ice cream are among the highlights of Camp.

Choral directors are always welcome to join us as guests of the District and we have a special session devoted to your questions and suggestions.

All meals...and nightly ice cream... are served in the dining hall. Hot meals are prepared by the camp staff and served by barbershop volunteers. The staff to camper ratio is roughly 1:3. Quartet coaching is also available.



Richard Lund coordinates all aspects of Youth Harmony Camp, from the recruitment of clinicians, teaching quartets, and volunteers to welcoming late night arrivals at Camp. In his 22nd year as director Richard is the heart and soul of Youth Harmony Camp.
